Dear District Residents:

On March 16th, the Board of Education adopted the school district budget for 2010/11. The total proposed budget is \$5,803,032. The total increase over this year's budget is \$108,557 (1.9 %), which includes a new 21-passenger handicapped school bus (\$57,000) to replace our current Boces bus. The total estimated tax levy increase is \$13,991 (0.33%). The final tax levy will be determined this summer after we receive final state aid revenue information.

When we started developing next year's budget our goals included maintaining educational programs and getting as close as possible to a 0% increase in the tax levy. In these difficult economic times we believe that we have accomplished our budget goals. All educational programs remain intact and the estimated tax levy increase is 0.33% as noted above.

You will receive this newsletter just a few weeks before our budget vote on May 18th. You will also receive a special newsletter regarding our school budget that provides specific information about the budget and how the budget will affect your property taxes. My responsibility as Superintendent is to present a budget plan to the Board of Education that meets all educational mandates and community expectations for educating our children. The Board's role is to carefully review my budget plan and propose a budget to the community that balances the educational needs of the children with community resources. The Board and I have completed our responsibilities and it is now up to the school district voters to decide the fate of our school budget. Don't forget there will be a public information meeting on the budget May 11th at 7 PM. If you have any questions please contact me.

On a personal note, our April weather has been wonderful. All the snow melted in Robin's garden by April 7th almost a month earlier than last year! We were able to get an early start on yard work and outside maintenance. Trout season has opened and fishing has started to pick up particularly in some of the local ponds. Rich Clawson stopped by last week to spread some BTI in the river. After talking to Rich, I was impressed by all the calculations and science required to determine the best location for BTI placement which happened to be right behind our home this year. Hopefully the black flies will be absent from our yard this spring (Rich said "don't count on it").

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK...

I hope everyone has been able to enjoy some of the warm weather we recently had. It seems good to be able to get the lawn raked before our regional bird (black flies) make their appearance.

By the time you receive this newsletter our grade 3-8 students will have taken the annual English Language Arts assessment and are gearing up for the math assessment. Although many believe that we test too much, one benefit is that we are able to evaluate where material needs to be re-taught and provide help to each student. We look forward to sharing the results with the students and parents soon.

As everyone probably knows, March is reading month. The entire school was absorbed with providing reading opportunities for all to enjoy. This includes DEAR Time where students and many staff drop everything to read at specific times of the day, the March Reading Challenge that is organized by Mrs. Harrington, the Book Fair, and PARP (Parents As Reading Partners) organized by the elementary teachers. This year was one of the best and not just because I got to wear some pasta! Congratulations to everyone that participated in this year's events and volunteered their time..

I have discussed in previous newsletters about the effects of bullying and specifically cyberbullying. This has recently come to the forefront with a Massachusetts teen taking her own life because of the bullying she received from other teenagers. This is a complex issue, as the typical bullying is comprised of bullying that takes place outside and inside of the school. Many times issues begin on the Internet through social websites such as Facebook, Myspace, and Instant Messaging. Eventually it seems to spill over into school. Unfortunately, much of the bullying takes place in areas where school personnel are not able to witness it, such as on the bus, in the cafeteria, in the hallway, and in the locker room just to name a few. When we are notified of such an incident we take it very seriously, complete a thorough investigation and take appropriate steps. Certainly we will be calling the parents involved to let them know what is going on. We are often notified by relatives about a cyberbullying incident that has taken place with their child. Although this is typically out of our control, it is good that we know about these things in order to pay particular attention to the students involved as it may become a school issue. We also try to use these situations as an opportunity to educate our students about this needless behavior. Mrs. Bureau recently sent around an email, which had various resources including

How Are Teens Cyberbullied?

Being a victim of cyberbullying can be a common and painful experience. Some youth who cyberbully

- Pretend they are other people online to trick others
- Spread lies and rumors about victims
- Trick people into revealing personal information
- Send or forward mean text messages
- Post pictures of victims without their consent

When teens were asked why they think others cyberbully, 81 percent said that cyberbullies think it's funny. Other teens believe that youth who cyberbully

- Don't think it's a big deal
- Don't think about the consequences
- Are encouraged by friends
- Think everybody cyberbullies
- Think they won't get caught

PRE-K REGISTRATION

A meeting for parents with children in the 2010-11 Pre-K program will be held on Wednesday, May 5, 2010 at 6:00 pm in the school Library.

NEW YORK STATE IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS

You will need to present proof of immunizations at the Parent mtg.

In order for your child to attend a NY State public school, he/she has to have had the following immunizations:

3 doses of Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) vaccine 3 doses if less than 15 months of age or 1 dose administered on or after 15 months of age.

3 doses of Hepatitis B vaccine.

3 doses of Diphtheria Toxoid Containing Vaccine (DTP, DtaP).

3 doses of the Oral Polio vaccine (OPV or IPV).

1 dose of the Measles-containing vaccine and 1 dose each of mumps and rubella (preferably as MMR).

1 dose of Varicella (Chickenpox) vaccine

Lead screening is recommended

Your child's pediatrician or your Public Health Nurse may recommend more doses of a vaccine than indicated above, these are only the minimum requirements for school entry.

Please call your physician or the Hamilton County Public Health Nursing Service at 648-6141 for an appointment or to obtain a copy of your child's record.

Hamilton County Public Health Nursing Service offers Immunization Clinics on the following dates in Indian Lake at the County Building on White Birch Lane:

May 20, June 17, July 15, Aug. 19

PRIOR TO ENTERING PRE-K YOU WILL NEED TO PRESENT TO THE SCHOOL PROOF OF PHYSICAL EXAM FROM YOUR CHILD'S MEDICAL DOCTOR WITHIN 12 MONTHS OF THE FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL. A CERTIFICATE FROM YOUR DENTIST OF A COMPREHENSIVE DENTAL EXAM WITHIN THE LAST 12 MONTHS IS RECOMMENDED, BUT IS NOT REQUIRED.

If your child is eligible to enter school and you have not received a letter by May 13, 2010, please contact the school at 648-5024.

The Rite Aid Drug Quiz show is a game show type competition where students answer questions on topics such as drugs, alcohol, gambling, addiction, self-esteem, anger management and decision-making. A round robin format was used in the competition providing each school two games. At the



completion of the tournament the teams with the top two point totals advanced to the championship game.

The Indian Lake team of Erica Dumond (Captain), Kyle Locke, Pamela Bennett, Andrea Brown, Shannon Farrell, Paul Strain and Cheyenne Wilder scored well enough in their first two games against Wells and Lake Pleasant to advance to the championship game against Lake Pleasant. In the championship game ILCS outscored Lake Pleasant to be named the 2010 Hamilton County Rite Aid Drug Quiz Show Champions.

In addition to each student receiving a certificate recognizing his/her accomplishments, the team was presented with a plaque and earned the honor to represent Hamilton County at the state level.

ILCS Art room has been an extremely busy place of late. In the last few weeks, I have been putting together the best of our student's artwork for the Spring Art Show, held annually alongside our spring concert. (Don't forget the dates~ for middle/high school, May 13th at 7:00 pm and May 18th at 6:30pm for elementary). Each class has contributed some wonderful work to the show; everyone has been super busy and extra creative in art this year! Here's what the kids have been up to....

Pre-K students have been learning about lots of new materials, tools and techniques. Amongst many other things; they have experimented with tearing paper, using stencils, stamping, painting, using chalk, working with watercolor paint, using glitter (Emmett will tell you all about that one) and collage.... you'll love the paper plate faces in the exhibition...so cute!

Kindergarten thought they were in science class for a while; or maybe even English, because while reading some wonderful books they learnt a lot about mice and bugs! We read the wonderful children's story 'Frederick' at the start of the year, and the children created their own Frederick character by tearing paper like the illustrator of the book does. They did wonderfully. Right after 'Frederick' we read 'Mouse Paint'; another great book which tells about some nosy mice who dip themselves in pots of paint and realize that primary colors mix to make secondary colors! Of course, through this book and their own experiments students were able to learn about color mixing and make new colors of their own! Next we moved on to learn about bugs, and the children created some very imaginative and cute bugs using cut paper and collage in their own designs. At the start of the year we also learnt about lines, and now we are printing lines! As you can tell, Kindergarten has been improving their skills in all sorts of art techniques!



First Grade students have such enthusiasm and energy! This was very clear when we worked on our 'people in motion' project, where the children were asked to both draw and create people in motion from clay. The results were wonderful, and we had a great time holding our motion poses for practice! This class has done lots of other fun stuff too, including learning about color mixing by making butterflies,

2nd Grade has been busy with animals this year! The class created some wonderful mosaic animals using tiny paper squares. I was very impressed with their patience and perseverance! Let me tell you, it's not easy to glue all those little squares onto the page! Their next project was called 'Paw prints' and focused on Adirondack animals. The students learned about which paw print they might expect to see in the snow for each animal, and created some wonderful paw print pendants from clay and beads. With March's noodle month in mind, the students even made their own noodle animal to match the paw prints...adorable!

3rd Grade might soon be famous! Their wonderful class teacher Mrs. Norris has helped the students to put together stories and illustrations for a group book that will be published soon. I was lucky enough to help the students a little with their work; and let me tell you- there are some great artists in this class! I have seen much evidence of this throughout the year in art; as we have worked on projects such as creative collages, noodle pencil boxes (for March noodle month, of course) and printing. The group learnt all about stenciling; created a big group stencil picture and their own personalized T-shirts too! Students also looked at the artist Chagall, who used memories and dreams as his inspiration, and 3rd graders used their own dreams or memories to create an artwork. 5th Grade is starting to show they are ready for middle school art. There are some real budding artists among the group with wonderful imaginations! As you will see in the exhibition, this group has been learning about different artists too. They learned about a Renaissance artist; Arcimboldo and his clever use of everyday objects to depict the human face. The 5th graders picked a theme that they liked, and used collaged images cut from magazines to create their own versions of the unusual artists work. They have also been learning some of the elements of art and principals of design; starting with shape and color, creating hot or cold color mosaics. They have studied positive and negative space; learning about these two elements as part of an 'outer space' project where they created a scene complete with planets and aliens! Their 'Fender Bender' projects also came out wonderfully, what fun we had learning about perspective and creating cars from metal!



6th Graders have been working on various projects this year ranging from Egyptian art (making an Egyptian mask from Clay) to superhero comic books! Within this group we have been focusing on the elements and principals of art and design. They learned about repetition, pattern and symmetry by making cut paper letters, and radial symmetry designs on computer using Publisher. They studied line and created line drawings and line art using yarn in the style of the Huichol Indians. They also used line to create paintings in the non-objective style.

7th Grade recently finished some wonderful 'mobiles' that are hanging proudly in the art room. These were a result of our studies into the artist Alexander Calder and his wire sculptures and mobiles. The students also made wire figures and animals in his style. Other artists have been important to our



art lessons in 7th grade too; we created oil pastel drawings in the Pointillist style, and also looked at Van Gogh's expressionist work as a source of inspiration for the ceramic tiles. The tiles showed a landscape with texture, emotion and movement in the expressionist style. The famous 'Scream' painting by artist Munch was also a source of inspiration great art work by this group. I asked the students to take the scream character and place it in a situation where they had felt despair or worry. There were some humorous results, ranging from family reunions to bad report cards! So parent, your kids do worry about those grades after all....

Studio Artists have been working on many new and exciting projects this year. They studied portraiture and created revealing images that show their interests, hobbies, memories and personalities. They learned about the grid enlarging technique, and used a natural form to enlarge in the style of Georgia O'Keefe. They took this one step further to create a group 'masterpiece' based on the work of Rene Magritte. In this image each student painted a square, and when all the squares were placed together they created an oversize eye...you can check this out at the top of the stairs next to the social studies room, its pretty cool!

History of Art in Practice are working their way (slowly but surely!) through the history of world art. They started by making a time line to display all the work chronologically along the

corridor next to the art room, and the first project to be displayed was based on the ancient art of the Egyptians. Students created paintings on paper with symbolic representations about their lives. Next the ancient Greeks inspired us with their pottery; and we made papier-mâché vases to represent their vessels. Following on came medieval art and the craft of manuscript illumination; the students made their own initial as an ornate and curving letterform. Moving on, we looked at the wonderful work of the Renaissance era; Michelangelo in particular. Our unusual project earned the students a spot on the front page of our local paper; as they replicated the technique of Michelangelo and painted upside down while lying flat on the floor and painting on the underside of the tables! Mr. Snide thought they were sleeping (!) but they were in fact creating marvelous reproductions of the Sistine Chapel ceiling panels. For their studies in Baroque art the class took on Durer's famous Rhino. The original 1515 etching was created purely from descriptions of a Rhino that the artist had heard from others; it was quite a remarkable piece of art. I asked the student's to use it's outline as their template and fill the body with objects that would still describe the form; showing the rib cage, feet, eye etc. The objects were to be on a theme of their choice and were highly varied: mechanical, technological, and fashionable. Look out for the rhinos in our art exhibition!



Photography students have been learning the essential techniques of taking good photographs. They have used techniques like 'framing' and 'emphasizing' their subject, using 'leading lines', and composing their image using 'the rule of thirds'. While the weather was colder we stayed inside and learned more about manipulation of images on computer using PhotoShop 5.5. Students had the opportunity to be creative with their images and those they found on the web making composite 'surrealist' images that included several images. Some of the results were very humorous! These students also used PhotoShop to create their own Pop Art style images, using Andy Warhol's foursquare technique. Each of the four images represents a side of their personalities.

High School News:

DO YOU NEED TO TAKE SAT-II SUBJECT TESTS? While most college-bound students take one or both of the general college admissions tests (SAT-I or ACT), you may also be required to take SAT-II Subject Tests in order to meet entrance requirements related to specific subject areas, including Writing, Literature, American History and Social Studies, European History and World Cultures, Mathematics Level IC or IIC (calculator), French, German, Hebrew, Latin, Spanish, Biology, Chemistry and Physics. They are generally given on the same dates as the SAT-I and at the same time. A common registration form is used for either the SAT-I or the SAT-II, and the same deadlines apply. We normally recommend that students needing SAT-II Subject Tests register for the June test date, in that it is closest to the end of the school year and completion of several related subjects. As you decide which of these tests to take, be aware that the Writing test seems to be the most commonly required test of those offered
